



# Begin at the beginning

## Being born healthy starts before conception



The first trimester of pregnancy, and even the weeks before, are the most critical periods in our life course


- programming of our perinatal health & health later in life
- most risk factors for unfavorable outcomes are present before pregnancy
  - -> assess, advice & modify

# Socioeconomic health inequalities



#### Large socioeconomic variations in health status, which could continue to widen

For people with low levels of education, life expectancy averages 6 years shorter than for people with high levels. In terms of life expectancy in self-perceived good health, the difference is 19 years. The gaps may widen in the near future. Many effects of the recent economic recession, such as unemployment, are only just emerging, and the lesser educated and other vulnerable groups have been hardest hit. Whether and how that trend will continue in the longer term is uncertain.






# Perinatal morbidity (2009-2014)

Small for gestational age (birth weight <10th percentile for gestational age)


NL: 142 per 1.000 births

# Perinatal mortality\* in neighbourhoods of Rotterdam (2000-2006)















# Relative risks for perinatal mortality in deprived districts

# Perinatal care: in need of a paradigm shift


- health starts before the conception

#### We are in need of


- close cooperation between obstetric care, public health and social domain

Het kraamkloppertje

Frans Hals museum, Haarlem. Dit kostbare kantwerk op de huisdeur was in de 17e eeuw het teken van geboorte. Het werd over een ebbehouten 'tafelije' gespannen, dat met rozerode zijde was overtrokken. Het bruidsboekt bevatte deze materialen in de vorm van een kanten strik en een rozerood lint. Thans worden de fraaie bruidstoiletten veelal gebruikt voor de bekleding van de wieg. Beide tijdsverschijnselen vertegenwoordigen op symbolische wijze de manier waarmee 'het kind in de continuïteit van het leven van de moeder wordt opgenomen' (Janssen, 1968)

**Definition of Social Obstetrics**;

'those aspects of personal and community life which have an impact on the child-bearing potential, habits and efficiency of a population and the health and treatment of individual woman, with particular reference to her reproductive system'



## Tailored care for couples, women and children

- in close cooperation between obstetric, maternity and youth health care & municipalities and local health authorities
- by sharing information
- by acknowledging and strengthening one another & one's potential roles
- to organize a continuum of care (pre-pregnancy to childhood)
- that contributes to better chances for children



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especially women with a higher risk on less favorable start at birth & less favorable infant growth and development

### Innovations & research



- Early start, before conception
  - collectively, by municipalities: social marketing & education
  - individually: preconception advise & care
- Systematic risk assessment & care
  - before, during and after pregnancy
- Referral to appropriate care
  - locally adopted care pathways
     to professionals from perinatal care & community health services
  - structural multidisciplinary consultation
- Outreaching

# Support mothers to secure future public health
